"Save the Blue Heart of Europe" campaign



VJOSA, ALBANIA



Albanian Court stops hydropower project on the Vjosa! Together with 38 affected residents, we <u>filed a lawsuit against the HPP project Poçem</u> last December – the first ever environmental lawsuit in Albania. In early May, the Administrative Court decided in our favour: for the time being, the dam must not be constructed. However, the Albanian government has already appealed the decision. If necessary, we will take this all the way to the Supreme Court. <u>MORE</u>





HPP Kalivaç revisited: For almost 10 years, the construction of the dam project Kalivaç has been halted, but now it shall be continued. The Albanian Ministry of Energy and Industry has cancelled the contract with the Italian Company Kalivaçi Green Energy only to open the procedures for re-issuing the concession shortly after. We are considering legal actions. MORE



Scientists for the Vjosa! The Vjosa lobby is getting bigger: in April, 25 scientists from 4 countries sampled the Vjosa in the area of the projected Poçem dam for a whole week. First results confirm the extraordinary biodiversity and complexity of this natural riverscape. In an <u>unusual press conference</u> on a gravel island in midst of the Vjosa they take position against the hydropower plan and demand further research. <u>MORE</u>

Previously, a group of scientist had already <u>strongly criticized the EIA of the HPP Poçem</u> in a letter to the Albanian Prime Minister.






European Parliament demands National Park for Vjosa and stop to hydropower projects! In the current Enlargement Report on Albania, the <u>EU has once more criticized Albania's hydropower policy</u> and also called for adjusting the quality of environmental assessments to EU standards. Vice President of the EU Parliament Ulrike Lunacek personally lobbies against the projected dams: "Don't destroy Vjosa!" she warns, as you can read <u>in this article</u>.



Vjosa mayors united against dams! The local authorities also stand behind our cause. The mayors of the Vjosa valley raised their concerns about the projected dams in open letter to Prime Minister Edi Rama.... MORE

RIVERS IN BOSNIA & HERZEGOVINA




New key country in the campaign: Bosnia and Herzegovina (BiH) still has many near-natural rivers, some of which hosting the endangered Huchen. Over 300 HPPs are projected throughout the country and the Center for Environment – our new campaign partner – together with the Coalition for the Protection of Rivers in BiH are working to prevent this exploitation. Kelag: environmental crime against Huchen River Sana! The Austrian-German Kelag company is constructing a hydropower plant on the Sana in BiH – in midst of a Huchen habitat, a highly endangered fish species particularly vulnerable to dams. Small is disastrous: the NGO BankWatch has looked into so-called small hydropower in the Balkans. Their report points out the devastating consequences for the environment and residents. MORE





New campaign: Remove the Dams!





Altenau: a valley gets its river back. The Altenau is a creek in Northrhine-Westfalia/Germany. In consequence of a flood, it was canalised and impounded since the 1970s. However, decades of dedication finally paid off: the Altenau is now being restored. Recently, another river section was given back to nature. Watch this video

Austrian Rivers



Mur: this is what green hydropower looks like. Lots of things have happened at the Mur in Graz/Austria: despite numerous protests, demanded referendum and a people committee, the construction of the highly controversial hydropower plant in Graz has started in February. Under police protection and against heavy protests <u>Mur trees have been clear-cut</u> – thousands by now. The project is also being fought in Court: the national Administrative Court is currently examining the contested expropriation of residents. In regards to the demanded referendum, the Court has recently ruled against the codetermination of the residents of Graz.

Ilisu: monument relocation in Hasankeyf. The Ilisu dam is to 90% completed. Despite years of opposition, the 600 year old <u>Zeynel Bey Tomb monument has been relocated</u>. The Dutch <u>Bresser company has been sharply criticized</u> in this regard for implementing the relocation of the historic monument. European's leading heritage organisation <u>Europa Nostra has voiced strong criticism</u>.
